Dear Friends:

We are beginning what should prove to be a most exciting year in the life of this parish. Mention is made elsewhere in this issue of News and Views of the plans for going forward with our building program. There is much to be done and it will be great fun doing it, I am sure.

Please don't expect the bulldozers and construction workers to be on the scene next week. We will be fortunate, indeed, if they are at work a year from now. Sketches and plans have to be made, discussed, changed, and finally approved. Pledges have to be made to a building fund, but you cannot pay the contractor with pledges, so a method of financing will have to be worked out. All of this will take time and a lot of effort and a lot of most interesting hard work.

Sunday School classes will begin on the second Sunday in September and the schedule of services will be the same as it was last year. Details of the Church School are to be found elsewhere in this issue.

The Episcopal Churchwomen of Saint Matthew's have planned what promises to be a most valuable and interesting series of programs. Dr. Louis Kesselman, who will be the speaker at the first meeting of the Churchwomen on September 12th, is undoubtedly the man in Louisville best qualified to open the year's program with a discussion of the current world situation and the relevance of Biblical teaching to our 1961 situation. I hope no woman will miss the opportunity to help start off the series with a large group in attendance.

SEPTEMBER 3 IS ANNIVERSARY SUNDAY

THE PAST... "May God's blessing rest upon us as we begin this venture with Him. May this be a friendly church and one whose members are devoted to our Lord. It is easy to foresee a great parish in this section within a very few years." (Excerpt from the bulletin at the first services of the present St. Matthew's Episcopal Church, held Sept. 5, 1948 at the St. Matthews Woman's Club building on Shelbyville Road, with the then Bishop of Kentucky, the Rt. Rev. Charles Clingman, conducting.) The mission, which began with 72 communicants and the Rev. Wilfred Myll as minister, gained parish status two and a half years later, in April, 1952. The following April, ground was broken for the first unit of our building program. It was dedicated in February, 1953, and the second unit was completed three years later.

THE PRESENT... Marking our thirteenth anniversary, a coffee hour will be held in the lounge following the 9:15 service on Sunday, September 3. Today there are 780 communicants.

THE FUTURE... The vestry recently voted to follow the original expansion plan calling for a new worship structure, and a building fund campaign is planned for early in 1962.

All of the above classes will be held in connection with the Family Service, which starts at 9:15 a.m. Preschool children and both first and second graders will go directly to their classes. (There will be a Children's Church Service for them in the Lower Lounge, led by Mr. C. P. Geleynse.) Children in the third through seventh grades will leave the service during the singing of the sermon hymn.

Classes for fourth-graders and below will be held downstairs; those for fifth-graders and up will be on the main floor.

Present plans are to have only one adult class this year. This will be an extension of the popular "kitchen class" led for several years by Ernestine and Earl Schaaf, and will meet in the overflow room beginning September 24. A revolving committee composed of four couples will be in charge.

AN INFORMAL COFFEE HOUR FOR ADULTS will be held on September 10 while the children are in classes following the Family Service.

Care for preschool children only will be provided during the 11 o'clock service, with Miss Kay Dulin in charge. As noted above, there will be a sitter for babies at both services.

DR. KESSELMAN ADDRESSES CHURCHWOMEN ON SEPT. 12

The world situation will be discussed by Dr. Louis Kesselman, chairman of the political science department of the University of Louisville, at the Churchwomen's first fall meeting.

Set for Tuesday, September 12 -- a week earlier than usual -- the meeting will begin with Holy Communion at 10 a.m. Following the program, the Bishop Woodcock Unit will serve lunch.

Dr. Kesselman recently completed a year on a Fulbright fellowship at the University of Helsinki, Finland, where he lectured on American politics and history.

A study of the Prophets will be undertaken at both general and unit meetings this year, announced Peg Louis and Helen Laird, who are co-chairmen of the Christian education committee.

Committee members agreed, they reported, that "the threat of Communism is of vital interest to us all, and that each of us would like to strengthen her knowledge of our Christian heritage. In order to understand the origin and background of the Christian religion a study of the Prophets seemed a logical place to begin.

"The Prophets worried about, and found solutions to, the same frustrating problems that vex us today. Like ours, theirs was an age of money-mad, luxury loving, easy religion."

The units will meet during the first week of October. A film on Amos will be shown, followed by discussion.

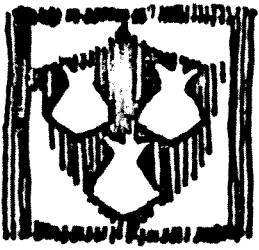

Dear Friends:

While glancing through an old diocesan journal I noticed that a dozen years ago the Diocese of Kentucky adopted a code of Christian Burial Procedure. Although I hope you will not need it soon, I think you should be aware of it, so I am reprinting it here in full:

1. That the Clergy be notified at once in case of the death of a parishioner, and that no arrangements in regard to the Burial Service be made until they have been consulted.
2. That all funerals of parishioners should normally be held in Church.
3. That the casket be closed at all times during and after the Service in Church, as is the traditional custom, and that it be recommended that this custom be also followed in the funeral chapels and in the home.
4. That the use of a pall is eminently desirable to signify God's love and mercy over all His works and as a laudable practice of Christian democracy.
5. That no flowers be used in the Church, except upon the altar, and, in lieu of a pall, upon the casket.
6. That fees or remuneration for the clergy should not appear on undertaker's bills except in case of legal necessity. Fees are not expected in the case of members of the Church. The services of the Church, without fee, are the right of all members of the Church.
7. That if music be desired, the guidance of the clergy must be sought in the selection of any music to be played or sung in order to comply with the rubrics of the Book of Common Prayer and the Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church. This same principal applies to the service itself.
8. That whenever the family elects to have the burial ritual of a fraternal order, military veterans' organization, or other such association, that that ritual be held at some time other than that appointed for the Church's Service; and that in the case of interment ritual, it be conducted after the completion of the Burial Service at the grave.
9. That a celebration of the Holy Communion on the day of the burial is most fitting as a means of bringing comfort to the bereaved and of setting forth the memorial of our Redeemer's Death and of its promise and pledge of the resurrection with Him unto everlasting life of all the faithful departed.
10. That the practice of cremation is not inconsistent with the Faith of the Church.
11. That the custom be encouraged of making gifts and memorials in the name of the deceased.

NEW BUILDING SKETCHES DUE FOR SHOWING SOON

As News and Views goes to press, Architect Fred Louis is completing preliminary sketches of his design for the new building proposed by the vestry. Plans are for a new church proper or permanent sanctuary, plus additional space for other activities. No details are available at this point.

The preliminary sketches are expected to go to the vestry early this month. If approved, the firm of Hartstern, Louis and Henry will then begin the work of translating the design into blueprints and specifications.

According to the present schedule, a representative of Marts and Lundy, New York, (the firm of professional fund-raisers under contract to stage our capital fund campaign) is due to arrive February 19 to begin work. Office space for his use will be provided at the church.

Chosen over two other applicants, Marts and Lundy "is one of the older firms in the field, and has an excellent reputation," Mr. Myll reported. Its specialty is raising funds for educational institutions.

The first stage of the drive will be a program designed to inform the parishioners of the proposed plans, and to this end a brochure will be prepared.

The preceding month Living Church had a picture of the new rood screen at St. John's Church, Alamogordo, N. M. Its similarity to ours "is too striking to be coincidental", Red wrote the editor, and proceeded to detail the creation of our screen. His pointed closing remarks were: "The similarity indicates that there must be a connection. I would be interested in knowing what the connection is."

Living Church ran the letter and pictures of both screens, without comment. The "connection", it turns out, is a direct one: the rector of St. John's, having seen a picture of our screen years ago in another church publication, requested Mr. Myll to send him the plans...which he did. Thus, new laurels for Fred Louis, Carl Bach and Lou Wright, who are responsible for the screen--and our love to the Rev. William Hicks, Christ Church, Lancaster, S. C., who still thinks of us sometimes.

One of the most outstanding laywomen of the Episcopal Church, Helen Smith Shoemaker of Pittsburgh, will conduct the School of Prayer sponsored by the diocesan Churchwomen Tuesday, February 6 at the Church of the Advent. Director of the Anglican Fellowship of Prayer, Mrs. Shoemaker has dedicated herself to imbuing others with her own deep conviction that "with faith, all things are possible". Prayer is the "one great recourse we have" that has not been given an adequate trial, she avers.

Author of The Secret of Effective Prayer and other books, she is the wife of the Rev. Samuel Shoemaker, a leading Episcopal clergyman who is himself the author of several well known works on prayer and healing.

Mrs. Shoemaker has organized hundreds of prayer groups in the New York and Pittsburgh areas. For seven years she conducted an interdenominational School of Prayer in Pittsburgh, and in 1959 was chosen the city's "Woman of the Year in Religion".

CHURCHWOMEN NOTES

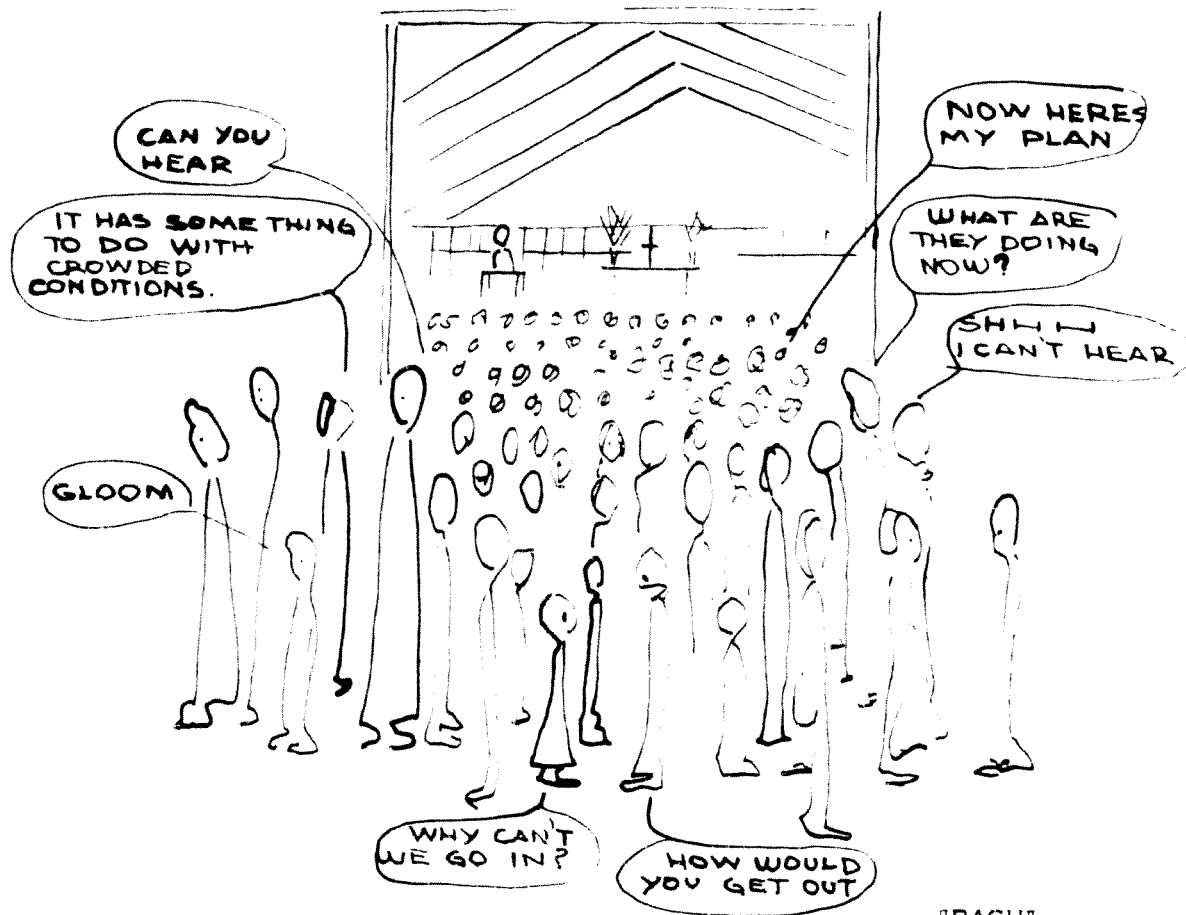
After a puny start (an under-nourished \$135 total on January 1) the Churchwomen's treasury was fattened up by \$789.57 (oh, let's make it the lovely big round sum of \$790!) which was netted from the 1961 sale of Christmas cards. Tickets from Scotty's Market brought in an additional \$29, bringing the total up to \$954. This year's approved budget is \$1685.

Last year the group spent \$2186 on items ranging from dish towels for our kitchen to Christmas gifts for 40 Navaho children. Almost half of that total, however, went to pay the diocesan pledge for both '61 and '62.

"Making something out of nothing" and "passing the basket" are current activities of some of the Churchwomen. New games? Not exactly, but lots of fun anyway, they report.

Dear Friends:

I am delighted to be able to announce that the latter part of July the Reverend Lorry Bosch will be coming to Saint Matthew's Episcopal Church as assistant rector. Right now I have to be a bit indefinite about the time of his arrival because Mr. Bosch and his family are on the way to Louisville from Durban, South Africa, via Europe and England.

The Bosch family consists of Mr. Bosch, his wife, June, and two children. The children are Jacqueline, twelve years old, and Amanda, almost six years old.

The Boschs are natives of South Africa, except for Amanda, who was born in England. Mr. Bosch graduated from Cambridge University as a civil engineer and worked as an engineer in South Africa (except for six and a half years with the Air Force during World War II), until 1956 when he went to Oxford, England, to study for the ministry. He was offered a scholarship at St. Luke's Seminary at Sewanee and so came to the United States after a year at Oxford to complete his theological studies. He stayed on here in the United States for some months doing special work in pastoral theology and then returned to South Africa, where he was for a time in charge of a couple of missions and later was assistant at the largest church in the diocese.

The Boschs were so taken by the United States that they have decided they want to spend the rest of their lives here. Mr. Bosch was most highly recommended by members of the faculty at Sewanee and by others under whom he had studied as well as by the Bishop of Natal and his former rector in Durban. I am sure that he will be a real help to all of us in the parish.

SUNDAY SCHOOL PICNIC JUNE 10

SUMMER SERVICE SCHEDULE SET

In July and August there will be only two services at Saint Matthew's on Sundays: Holy Communion at 7:30, and the Family Service at 9:15. Sunday School ends June 3; beginning on June 10 there will be care for pre-school children downstairs and film strips in the lounge for older children.

During the summer months (beginning on June 13) the mid-week service of Holy Communion will be celebrated on Wednesdays instead of Tuesdays. The time is 10 a.m.

BUILDING FUND HITS 93% OF GOAL

Pledges received since the close of the Building Fund Campaign have raised the total to \$148,433.41, which is 93% of the \$160,000 Victory Goal, General Chairman Henry Scheirich reports. A total of 246 pledges have been received, making the average pledge about \$603.

"A few cards are still out, and we believe that within a short time the remaining sum of \$11,500 will be secured and the full \$160,000 objective will be reached," he said.

"The timing for beginning the construction of the new sanctuary will depend on the rate of payment of the pledges and the speed with which our architects can complete plans and specifications. This planning usually takes more time than is expected.

"However, the arranging of the financial part of the construction program may be controlling, and a valid target date for the letting of the contracts might be just after the first of the year."

Total costs of putting on the campaign came to \$6800, which is only 4.5% of the total sum raised. Of this amount, \$4000 was spent for the professional help of Marts and Lundy, and the rest went for printing costs of the brochure and other mailings, dinners, postage, etc.

The present total is four per cent higher than the amount which had been pledged when the final report was made April 13, after an intensive six-week campaign.

"The campaign was notable for the good turnout of the solicitors at the many report meetings, the lovely meals served at these meetings by the loyal ladies of our parish, and the good will that was evidenced by everyone," the chairman said.

BOB CHERRY ORDAINED AT MURRAY

The Rev. Robert Cherry, formerly of Saint Matthew's, was ordained to the priesthood on May 28 at St. John's Church in Murray. For the past year he has been deacon-in-charge at St. John's and St. Martin's-in-the-Fields at Mayfield. Bob, Betty, and their four children live at Mayfield.

Mr. Myll preached the ordination sermon. Also attending from our parish were Margaret Curry and Polly Wilder.

CONFERENCE CENTER PLANS INCLUDE JULY 4 "EXPERIMENT"

Midway in a full schedule of diocesan camp plans for various age groups is an experimental guest period covering July 1 through 5, designed for families who want to spend all or part of the July Fourth week at Rough River. The regular Center staff will be on hand, and all the usual recreation facilities will be available; also, regular worship services are planned. School-age children must be accompanied by an adult, and \$3 must be sent with your reservation, which should be made well in advance. Rates are \$4 a day for adults and \$2 a day for children under 12.

In addition to this special family camping arrangement, a Family Life Conference is set for July 8-14 with the Rev. Glendon Coppick as director. Cost is \$21 for adults and \$12 for children 12 and under.

Another innovation this year is the Father and Son Weekend Conference, sponsored jointly by the Men of Kentucky and the Young Churchmen of the diocese. Charles B. Tachau, former juvenile judge of Jefferson County and now a seminarian in Virginia, will be the discussion leader. The conference begins on Friday, July 6, with supper at 6 p.m., and ends Sunday after lunch. Cost is \$7.50; reservations (with \$2) must be in by June 27.

All the camps will offer a full program of activities, including swimming and water sports. Here is the schedule: Senior High, June 13-23; Christian Adventure Camp (for girls who have finished grades 4 and 5) June 24-30; Guest Period, July 1-5; Father and Son Weekend, July 6-8; Family Life Conference, July 8-14; Junior High, July 15-21; Explorers' Camp (for boys who have finished grades 4, 5, 6 and 7) July 22-28; Christian Adventure (for girls who have finished grades 6 and 7) July 29-August 4; Adult Conference, August 5-11; College Conference, August 29-31.

Mr. Myll will be the director of the Junior High Conference. Leader of the Adult Conference will be the Rev. Don Frank Fenn, an outstanding leader of the General Convention for the past twenty years.

Further information and registration forms may be obtained at the church office. Since facilities are limited, registrations should be made as soon as possible to be assured of admittance.

On the first Sunday in September (September 6th, this year) we will celebrate the Sixteenth Anniversary of the establishment of the present Saint Matthew's Episcopal Church. Services on September 6th will be as follows:

Following the 9:15 a.m. service there will be a Reception to celebrate our Anniversary.

SOME HISTORICAL FACTS OF INTEREST

April 2, 1948 - 24 persons who were interested in establishing a congregation of the Episcopal Church in St. Matthews met in Bishop Clingman's living room. 15 persons signed a petition requesting such a congregation.

June 1, 1948 - The Rev. Wilfred Myll called to be minister-in-charge of the Mission.

Sept. 5, 1948 - First service held in the St. Matthew's Woman's Club. (72 communicant members were enrolled at that time.)

April 10, 1951 - Saint Matthew's Mission obtained "parish" status and the Rev. Wilfred Myll became "rector" instead of "minister-in-charge". (238 communicant members at this time.)

April 6, 1952 - Ground-breaking for the first unit of our building program (280 communicant members at this time.)

June 29, 1952 - The cornerstone laid.

Feb. 8, 1953 - The first unit was dedicated. (343 communicant members at the time.)

Feb. 15, 1953 - First service held in the new building.

June 23, 1955 - Ground was broken for the 2nd unit in our building program. (539 communicant members at the time.)

Jan. 8, 1956 - Sunday School classes held for the first time in the new unit.

March 16, 1962 - Kick-off meeting for building fund to build the third unit in our building program.

Nov. 17, 1963 - Ground breaking for the third unit in our building program, the church building now under construction. (800 communicant members)

(? ? ?) - First service in the new church building.

In the bulletin of the first service in 1948 it was written - "May God's blessing rest upon us as we begin this venture with Him. May this be a friendly church and one whose members are devoted to our Lord. It is easy to foresee a great parish in this section within a very few years."

May God's blessing be upon us as we continue our venture. May we each do our part in thanksgiving and in the use of our time, our talents, and our money for the spread of His Kingdom.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CLASSES START SEPTEMBER 13TH

9:15 A.M. - 11:00 A.M.

The main difference in the 9:15 Sunday School and 11:00 Sunday School is the involvement of the parents. The 9:15 service is called the Family Service because the families attend as a unit and all attend Sunday School. Hence, we ask the parents of children crib-room age and up not to take their children from their class rooms until the bell rings.

At the 11:00 service the parents attend the regular service upstairs and the children attend their own service downstairs. There are no adult classes at this time.

During the 9:15 Sunday School pre-schoolers go directly downstairs to their classrooms. Children in Kindergarten and First grade will go directly to the lower lounge for the Children's Service. Children in 2nd grade through 7th grade will leave the regular service in the church during the singing of the sermon hymn. We particularly ask parents to see that their young ones attend the service appropriate to their grade, since they need help in finding their place the first few months.

I wish, at this point, I could say where each class will be meeting. I do know that the younger children will be downstairs and that the older ones will be someplace! The upper grades may have to shift occasionally as the building program proceeds. For the first Sunday there will be floor maps posted in strategic spots showing classroom locations, plus a large map posted in the narthex.

Present plans for an adult class have to be flexible too. Mr. Myll will have a class in the nave of the church and there will be coffee served for another group - someplace to be decided.

We may have a few inconveniences this year but we can have fun with them as we go along.

During the 11:00 a.m. service there will be classes for children - pre-school through 6th grade, in the following groups:

Crib - Nursery 2's with Mrs. Aprile; 3, 4, and 5 year olds; 1st, 2nd and 3rd grades; 4th, 5th and 6th grades.

The children at 11 o'clock will go right to their class rooms and the service will be held for them there.

If you are interested in the 11 o'clock Sunday School and want more information call Miss Baldwin. We do ask that there be no switching back and forth between the 9:15 and 11:00 a.m. classes because there will be a different curriculum used at 11:00 and it makes it difficult for the child involved since there is a carry-through in the class material from Sunday to Sunday.

THE CLOTHES CLOSET - It does not seem possible that there would be any one in our parish who does not know what the "Clothes Closet" is or does. If, however, the clothing left at church each week is any indication of our parish's knowledge of it, then a lot of people are unaware or have forgotten.

In any case, a brief outline of its history seems necessary. The "Clothes Closet" was begun in March, 1959, by Saint Matthew's Churchwomen. It was and still remains the only free clothing outlet in the city or county created to aid the social worker's dilemma in supplying clothing to families they serve. It was housed until March, 1964, in the basement gym of St. Luke's E & R Church, 19th and Jefferson. Saint Matthew's supplied volunteers and clothing alone for a good while. In 1961, when St. Luke's asked to join hands with us in supplying clothes, we welcomed their five faithful volunteers (still with us) and their congregation's support. When it became apparent that the demand was exceeding our 2-church endeavor, the Churchwomen's Diocesan Executive Board was asked and voted, in September, 1963, to - "support the Clothes Closet under the sponsorship of the Departments of Supply and Christian Social Relations."

Episcopal churches in the Louisville Convocation were asked to support the project, which they have done overwhelmingly. The Churchwomen's Diocesan Executive Board considers this project their most important local endeavor.

In April, 1964, the Clothes Closet moved its operation to Christ Church Cathedral House basement, with the blessings of Dean Estill, because St. Luke's church was sold. All participating Episcopal churches have a given month to furnish volunteers and clothing.

* * * * *

Though lack of clothing is not the only reason for the drop-out situation in our city and county schools, it is a definite factor. Many days of school are lost by children who have to miss because they don't have a warm enough coat or a decent pair of shoes.
